Hipercor sentence welcomed

The Catalan Association of Victims of Terrorism (ACVOT) welcomed yesterday's sentences of 790 years prison for ETA bombers Santiago Arróspide and Rafael Caride Simón for their part in the 1987 supermarketbombing in Barcelona. However ACVOT president Roberto Marique said "17 years on it was high time the guity were sentenced" and added that some aspects, such as litigation against the government by the victims for mistakes made by the security forces, are still un resolved.

Residency backlog reduced

The Spanish government's drive to reduce waiting times for immigrants to renew their residency permits is producing results in Catalonia. Less than two weeks after a new decentralised system was brought in, "23,000 to 24,000 cases has been processed," said Joan Rangel, delegate for the Spanish government in Catalonia yesterday. In Tarragona alone, 700 cases have been settled, he said. Catalonia was the autonomous community most affected by the backlog as just last month 45,000 cases were outstanding.

Budget for Sants work approved Barcelona city council yesterday approved a budget of 16 million euros for expropriating land required for the redevelopment of Sants station. The work will be carried out in preparation for the arrival of the AVE high speed train in 2007. The city council will spend no less than 50 million euros in total on the project which will also involve rebuilding Sants coach station and covering the railway tracks from the district of Riera Blanc to Hospitalet.

Catalonia's quality of life ranks on the same level as Denmark

Women in Catalonia have the world's second highest life expectancy

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Catalonia has a quality of life on a par with Denmark and much higher than Spain as a whole, and life expectancy for Catalan women is the second highest in the world, according to figures from 2002 released this week by the Institute of Statistics of Catalonia (Idescat).

Catalonia comes 16th in the world ranking in terms of quality of, higher than Germany (19th), the whole of Spain (20th) and Italy (, but behind the leaders Norway and Sweden21st). Idescat based their calculations on the Catalan life expectancy of 80 years, only surpassed by Japan with 81 years, as well as its level of education and standard of living.

Apart from Japan, only Sweden and Hong Kong can match Catalonia's high life expectancy of 80.2 years of age. Figures for women show that Catalan women average 83.4 years, second only to Japan, where the average is 85 years. This is closely followed by other Spanish women, the French, the Hong Kong Chinese (82.7), the Swedes (82.5) and the Swiss (82.3). Catalonia can also be found among countries in which there is more equality between men and women, like Germany and the Netherlands, despite men's average yearly income (28,157 euros) doubling that of women (14,522 euros).

Where Catalonia falls down is in education as a small percentage of its population (1.62%) is still illiterate, as well as a slightly higher proportion that have no access to education at all. What is more, the rate of enrolment in schools in 2002 only averaged 86.91% and an even lower proportion of people attended non-

compulsory education.

This week also saw Barcelona presented with a report from the United Nation's Development Programme detailing human development in 157 countries in 2002. This report shows that in terms of life expectancy and wealth, Catalonia clearly surpasses the rest of Spain with figures of 79,2 years of age and 17,383 euros

per inabbitant. However, the rest of Spain comes higher in the index in relation to education with a figure of 0.97, compared with Catalonia's 0.94%. Catalonia's wealth per head is calculated at 21,226 euros and its GDP is similar to that of Italy, Finland and the UK, which situates it among the first fifteen richest countries in the world.

First Civil War grave exhumed in Osona

A common grave containing the remains of people killed during the Spanish Civil War has been exhumed by the Catalan autonomous government or Generalitat in the village of Prats de Lluçanès in Osona district. The grave was found to contain the bodies of six Republican soldiers and one civilian. Scientists at the Institute of Legal Medicine are now working on identifying the victims. The team, lead by the institute director Josep Arimany, expects to

The exhumation, the first carried out by the Generalitat in Catalonia, took place in late June. The operation was done in total secrecy so as not to invade the privacy of the family who lives at the site. Extensive research, including interviews with relatives of people who disappeared during the war, was carried out before the grave was dug up. The Generalitat wishes to use this experience to serve as a model for future exhumations of this kind.

The company BCNskytours offers a new way to discover Barcelona on a new helicopter

Have your ever imagined how pigeons and seagulls see Barcelona? Well now, if you have the money and the guts, you can experience it for yourself. The company Cat Helocòpters has recently launched a new service: a 10-minute ride in a helicopter, offering a different view of the city.

The 70-euro tour starts at the port, flies to the Forum area and crosses the main part of Barcelona up to Tibidabo hill. In the return path, passengers get to see Montjuïc, with all the Olympic facilities, and finally arrive back at the starting point. During the journey, one can admire some of the most famous buildings in the city, including the Sagrada Familia and the striking (for its shape and height) Torre Agbar, from a different perspective.

The heliport where the helicop ter takes off and lands is the first in Spain to offer tourist flights. The hangar has room for six aircrafts and the facilities occupy 4,026 square metres. The total investment has exceeded the one million euro figure. Moreover, apart from meeting the strictest environmental standards, the heliport has had to be placed 2.5 km away from any inhabited building in order to fulfillall security criteria.

Like New York, Barcelona is an excellent city to host this kind of service, "because panoramic flights are ideal in coastal cities," savs Micky Ribera, BCNskytours manager. The company offering helicopter trips in New York was forced to cancel its services after the 11-S attacks. Nevertheless, it went back into business two years later with tighter security measures.

Electrity transformers installed after substation blaze

The electricity company Unión Fenosa has set up two mobile electricity transformers to supply power to the neighbours in the area affected by last Thursday's blaze at the substation "Mediodía", on Carrer Alameda in the Centro district of Madrid. A spokesman for the company announced today that the two transformers have been connected up to the substations of Princesa on Calle Antonio López, Cerro de Plata on Méndez Álvaro and in the Salamanca district, on Calle de Goya. Yesterday morning, 500 homes and businesses were still without any electricity supply, including local restaurants and shops. However, some establishments, including the NH hotel and the local McDonald's have installed their own transformers to provide an electricity supply. Unión Fenosa has also announced that it will immediately begin dealing with all the claims submitted by property owners on the block that was affected for any damage or loss that was caused by the fire.

Women to have more say in the Generalitat

The rough draft of the Action and Development Plan for Women's Politics which is being produced by the Catalan government is to include a call for more participation by women in the government's decision-making organisations, and to generally give women a greater voice. The Catalan Institute of Women (ICD) submitted this document on Thursday to the Interdepartmental Commission for Equal Opportunity, at a meeting at the Catalan government building. The ICD's proposal is a response to the fact that women's associations have felt frustrated by the fact that Pascual Maragall's government has failed to deliver on its promises of parity between sexes.

"Fresh fruit on the beach" campaign starts

Catalonia Qualitat, the Catalan association for Fruit Producing Organisations, is beginning a promotion campaign to encourage people to eat fruit on the beach this summer. This will involve distributing 10,000 kilos of apples, pears, peaches and nectarines on Catalonia's beaches. The Empordà town of Roses will be the first of the 24 coastal towns on this campaign, which will begin today and finish on August 10 at l'Hospitalet de l'Infant.

Indian school blaze kills 77 and more casualties are expected

Rescuers frantically bashed holes through brick walls to try to save trapped children as a fire engulfed a thatched-roof school in southern India, killing 77 children. The thatched roof fuelled the flames before collapsing on the victims, police said. In one part of the school, charred bodies, their clothes burnt off,

deep. "It is a horrible tragedy, you will lose your mind if you see the bodies," said housewife Rajalakshmi Subramaniam. Police Deputy Inspector-General R.C. Kudawla told Reuters the death toll was 77. At least 30 children were injured, many seriously. The fire started in a kitchen where lunch was being prepared

covered the floor two and three for hundreds of children and swiftly spread to the roof of the Lord Krishna school in Tamil Nadu state. Many of the dead suffocated after being trapped on a narrow staircase leading to the ground floor. Charred school bags and open lunch boxes, many still containing food, littered the staircase and corridors hours after the fire was extinguished.

Slobodan Milosevic suffers from the flu, exhaustion and high blood pressure / EPA

Milosevic defence delayed until August 31

The start of former Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic s defense case has been postponed again because of his high blood pressure, The Hague war crimes tribunal said Friday. Milosevic was due to open his defense Monday against charges of genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes in the Balkans in the 1990s, but his doctor has said he is not well enough to attend the hearing, already delayed several times. "The Milosevic trial has been

adjourned until Tuesday 31 August," a tribunal spokesman said. The chamber considered the med ical report from his doctor that said on the basis of the blood pressure values of the accused he should not attend the hearing."

The trial's three judges last week declared Milosevic fit enough for his much-delayed trial to proceed but warned they might have to impose a defense lawyer on him. The court still has to take a decision on that issue, the spokesman said.

Blair's Labour Party loses seat to Liberal Democrats

The Labour Party has lost the Leicester South parliamentary by-election, after narrowly avoiding defeat in Birmingham Hodge Hill, in the wake of a damning report on the intelligence he used to justify war in Iraq. Parmjit Singh Gill of the Liberal Democrats won 10,274 votes in the Leicester South seat, beating the Labour candidate by more than 1,600 votes. At the 2001 general election, Labour's majority was more than 13,000.

"The justification which Tony Blair gave for backing George Bush was wrong," Singh said in his victory speech. "The people of Leicester South have spoken for the people of Britain. Their message is that the prime minister has abused and lost their trust. He should apologise and he should apologise now."

In the Birmingham seat of Hodge Hill Labour just held off the Lib-Dems by 460 votes as their 2001 majority of 11,000-plus was all but wiped out. Both seats have large Muslim populations, making the Iraq war a hot topic. Prime Minister Tony Blair's public trust ratings have plunged since he took Britain

to war in Iraq last year. Wednesday's report into intelligence failings on Iraq gave his anti-war critics fresh ammunition.

Former cabinet secretary Lord Butler absolved Blair of distorting the intelligence but said Baghdad had no significant stores of chemical or biological weapons ready for use, despite Blair's pre-war claim that it did.

Former world chess champion Fischer arrested in Japan

Former world chess champion Bobby Fischer, the only US citizen to ever hold the title, has been detained in Japan by immigration authorities, officials sai. A brilliant but volatile player, Fischer became world champion in 1972 after beating Boris Spassky of the then-Soviet Union in a match considered something of a Cold War propaganda victory for the United States. Fischer, 61, was taken inlast to custody Wednesday on suspicion of holding an invalid passport when he trieleave from Tokyo's Narita airport for the Philippines, Kyodo news agency said, quoting Japanese chess officials. It said immigration officials were investigating how Fischer entered Japan and planned to deport him soon. A spokesman for the Immigration Department confirmed Fischer was detained but gave no details.

Miami has the largest foreign-born population of any city in the world, according to a United Nations report. 59% of people in the city were not born in the US, the UN Development Programme report said. The city is home to many Cubans, as well as migrants from the Caribbean and South America. The cityToronto in Canada had the second-highest proportion of foreign-born citizens (44%), while Los Angeles was a close third with 41%. Outside North America, the town-state of Singapore scored highest (33%), followed by Australia's Sydney (31%), Abidjan (30%) in Ivory Coast, London (28%) and Paris (23%).

Alain Juppé steps down from France's rulingparty AGENCIES

Former French prime minister Alain Juppé has resigned his post as president of France's ruling UMP party. His resignation opens the way for a succession battle at the head of president Jacques Chirac's party. Ambitious finance minister Nicolas Sarkozy is vying for the party leadership, although Mr Chirac has said he would not be able to remain a minister and lead the party. Juppé had been expected to step down after being convicted of corruption.

'Today I move away from political life in order to make peace with myself after the torment I have just been through," he said in an open letter to party members released by the UMP. A new party leader will be chosen at a party congress in November. Sarkozy has not yet officially declared himself a candidate for the post. Juppe received an 18month suspended prison sentence, and was also barred from public office from 10 years earlier this year. The charges related to a jobs scam at Paris City Hall while Chirac was mayor. Juppé has appealed against his conviction, but an appeal hearing will not take place until mid-October. He remains a member of parliament and the mayor of Bordeaux.

Everyone differs over the dish that unites them

Originally from Valencia, paella is now found everywhere from Vigo to Valladolid

Our review of the role of rice in Catalan cuisine would not be complete without reflecting on the importance of paella which, from its humble origins in Valencia, has become Spain's national dish and perhaps the one thing that binds this federation of 17 autonomous regions together, although there are as many views on what constitutes a correct paella as there are inhabitants of the peninsula.

There is probably no dish that has had more crimes committed in its name. Valencianos blanch at the ghastly concoctions passed off in tourist resorts as paella, those rainbow coalitions of ingredients heaped against a backdrop of chromeyellow rice, bright with food colouring, not saffron. In a nation that loves to argue, few topics excite such passion as a debate over what does and does not constitute a true paella. This is partly because it is a dish traditionally prepared by men, and in many cases is the only thing men know how to cook.

one point: it is a celebration of rice and not what goes with the rice. The other points of consensus are: it is a communal dish; it should be cooked in a paella on an open fire, preferably made of the branches of fruit trees; once cooked it should be allowed to repose for 5-10 minutes, and it should be eaten outside at lunchtime. (In restaurants, Thursday is traditionally paella day, apparently a hangover from when it was the servants day off and people went out to eat.) The open fire may seem a pretension but all aficionados agree that the flavour of wood smoke is an essential component.

Sooner or later, in any discourse on the subject of paella, someone will use the word miraculous. The first miracle is the rice. Spanish rice is as hard as stone, and the art of the paellero is to render it both dry and succulent, while producing a base that is caramelised almost to the point of being burnt, the much prized socarrat. Once the rice has been added to the paella it should not be interfered with, so the art is However, there is agreement on in the quantities and, above all, the

fire. The second miracle lies in the ability of the apparently obdurate rice to take on the flavours of the other ingredients.

The traditional paella valenciana contains chicken, rabbit, green and white beans, olive oil, saffron and either snails or rosemary. Never snails and rosemary, as the former feed on the latter, so to use both would be culinary tautology. However, by far the most popular paella is the seafood version, paella marinera, which generally consists of prawns and mussels and squid. The key is the rice. If you get that right, your guests may be willing to overlook other eccentricities. But remember, whatever you do, someone is bound to say that you've got it all wrong.

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Priorat wines — from humble origins to the top of the wine league table

Today we visit the internationally renowned wine-producing area of Priorat which is represented by theDenominació d'Origen de Qualitat (DOQ) Priorat and the Denominacioó d'Origen (DO) Montsant. This area, which was originally known for producing rough, heavy wines that were used to give body to wines from other areas, now produces wines of such quality that they have leapt to the top of the global league table in a relatively short period of time.

This turnaround was masterminded by a small group of skilled professionals from traditional wine-growing families, such as Álvaro Palacios, and headed by René Barbier. After studying the relief and climate, they started experimenting with new growing and production techniques, and the result came as a great surprise to a French friend of Palacios; he was a noted wine specialist and

published a review declaring that this Priorat wine was one of the finest in Spain. With the encouragement of international recognition, from 1989 to 1992, they continued to produce wine jointly until each went their separate ways. Strasbourg, Paris, New York and so on were the destinations for their products until a New York auction valued one of the wines at 600 euros per bottle. The Priorat boom had arrived.

And of course, this boom has had repercussions within the region - the increased value of the grapes meant that vine-growers whose business had previously been ailing did not have to sell up, as well as encouraging young people to return home and to take up the reins of family businesses founded by their grandparents.

The wineries we visited are the products of this boom: the Celler Ripoll Sans and the Celler Viñedos de Ithaca, de Gratallops, both

of the DOQ Priorat. The first was set up by the younger generation of the Ripoll family. In 1999, Marc RipollgaveuphisBarcelonajobto go back to his native village and set up a winery and begin cultivating the 9 family fields (9.5 hectares) with the traditional garnatxa and carinyena varieties. In 2000 their first wines came out under the brand Closa Batllet. The following harvest produced the red that was recently awarded the highest score in the prestigious Parker guide. It is a complex, elegant wine made from 60% carinyena and aged in oak vats for 15 months (10,000 bottles approx. 25 euros). Marc also developed a native white: l'escanyavella. The result was 300 bottles of a singular and surprising white Priorat which is south of Spain and which is a sinobviously very difficult to find.

Near the town of Gratallops we come to the Celler Viñedos de Ithaca. It is run by the energetic Silvia Puig, the daughter of Josep Puig, whose Baix Penedes company makes the world-famous Fòrum vinegar. Father and daughter bought a place near Gratallops and planted traditional varieties like garnatxa along with interna-

tional types such as Syrah. In 1999, experimentation led to the first 4,000 bottles of white and red. In 2001 they brought out the red Odysseus (24 euros) made from 35% garnatxa, 35% carinyena, 20% Cabernet sauvignon and matured in vats for 12 months. They also brought out two peculiar whites: a surprising garnatxa white (10.60 euros), which was neither fermented nor matured in vats, and a Pedro Ximenes (10.60 euros), a rarity made with a grape from a forgotten vinyard in the gular, complex wine.

Seeing how these entrepreneurs have achieved so much in so little time, I would strongly advise keeping an eye on them, to see what other treasures we can expect from them in the future.

STEPHEN BURGEN The unbearable brightness of being

n his novel Crime and Punishment Dostoyevsky describes a man literally clinging to life, condemned to live on a cliff face, drinking rainwater and surviving on what few scraps of food he can find to ward off starvation. The man's life is miserable, with nothing but more misery in prospect, and yet he doesn't give up but clings doggedly on. Why? Because this is the only life he has; without it he has, and is, nothing.

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Dostoyevsky wrote before the concept of quality of life had been dreamt up, but no doubt his cliff-man would have ranked pretty low in the survey reported in today's paper which put Catalonia 16th in the world rankings for quality of life. This calculation is mainly based on the unusually long life expectancy enjoyed by people here (only Japanese women live longer than their Catalan counterparts), suggesting that more is intrinsically good. As yet no one has come up with a satisfactory explanation for the longevity of Catalans, although some suggest that their unwillingness to die simply reflects a generalised resistance to change.

According to the study, Catalonia is on a par with Denmark (Norway and Sweden come top, which should give some idea of what is meant by quality). Without delving too deeply into these shaky concepts, barely ten years ago it would have been unthinkable for Catalonia to be on a par with Denmark in any respect. You don't have to be older than forty to recall a time when this was a place of widespread poverty and to remember a Bar-

celona of beggars and barefoot children. (The what the whole quality of life business cannot beggars are still here, but they are imported.)

So, if quality of life means food rather than hunger, work rather than unemployment, health rather than disease and education rather than ignorance, well who's going to argue with that? The absence of suffering in daily life is only lamented by the most abject romantics. Average life expectancy in this country has more than doubled in the past 100 years, but nail down is the elusive matter of happiness.

Whenever you see the Scandinavian countries scoring so highly in these surveys, you are tempted to ask why they have such appallingly high suicide rates and such seemingly intractable problems with alcohol. Are they ungrateful? Are they literally bored to death by the high quality of their lives?

Everyone knows that you can't buy hap-

piness but if you have enough money you can rent it, or that's what we seem to have spent the past 50-odd years trying to prove. But now that we have everything, we are disappointed, we feel ripped off. Since around 1960 the inhabitants of what we like to call the developed world have been the healthiest, wealthiest and, one would have thought, the luckiest people ever to have strolled through this vale of tears. Barely a generation since the grim reaper took every third child through diphtheria, whooping cough or infection, now it is cause for a police investigation if a baby dies. And how many times these days do you see inscribed on a woman's tombstone the words "died in childbirth"? Far from going hungry, we eat until our hearts burst, but no matter, that can be fixed with a plastic valve or, in extremis, someone else's heart. Seen from our grandparents' perspective, we are in Eden.

But we have become fretful in paradise. Almost the moment we arrived, we started finding fault. Now medicines that work are rejected in favour of more "natural" therapies that only might. No sooner have we dumped God than we discover astrology. There is a growing mood, one might even say movement, of romanticism reminiscent of the 19th century, a harking back to an older Eden that never was. It's as though all this quality of life weighs on us, as if we feel we don't really deserve it. Here we are, in the driving seat of destiny as never before, with less than ever of our lives in the hands of God or Kismet, and we want to give it all back.

Spain's forgotten war

This weekend in 1936, Franco's revolt was snuffed out in Barcelona - a heroic event that we should never forget

18 July 1936 has become a date in the history books rather than something from living memory. It was the day Spain's generals revolted against the legally-elected Republican Government. Franco, Mola and the other conspirators expected their coup to be quick and relatively painless, but on the contrary, resistance was so fierce that it took three years of civil war to finally inter the Republic.

The generals' coup turned Spain into an absolute charnelhouse: in the worst single atrocity of the war, 1,800 people were massacred in the Badajoz bull-ring on 15 August 1936 (the fiesta of the Virgin). In fact, murder became army policy, and as General Mola told his troops, "Our actions must be very violent". Theirs was the Spanish brand of Hitler's National Socialism and Mussolini's Fascism. But what possible relevance can July 18 have for us today? After all, only a lunatic fringe now hankers after Hitler or military coups. However, July 18 still pulses below the surface of Spain's political life. It can be seen, for instance, in the reluctance of the Partido Popular - the governing party in Spain from 1996 to last March, all democrats to a man and woman - to condemn Franco's rebellion. Finally, they did so in 2002, but only under pressure. That in itself is an amazing fact, when one considers that Christian Democrats in France, Germany and Italy have all formally condemned their respective dictatorships of the 1940s.

In Catalonia, there is a tendency to over-simplify things by thinking that the PP are retrograde Castilian centralists, and that we are all nice and progressive here. This cosy position was effectively deflated by Ignasi Riera's recent book *Els catalans* de Franco, which documents the widespread support for the dictator among Catalan people. Indeed, Francesc Cambó, to whom a statue has been dedicated on Via Laietana, was Franco's main banker. Other suspects include Salvador Dalí, a passionate devotee of Franco, and twentieth-century writer. Riera s book is part of a widespread debate on the Civil War which has opened up in the last few years. During the late-70s transition period, the Civil War was played down as, understandably, the many people who had suffered so much did not want old wounds re-opened. However, the mainstream parties took advantage of this in what has often been called a "pact of forgetfulness". This meant

that none of the torturers were son, the eminent American historbrought to trial and no form of compensation was paid to the victims. The pact encouraged the view that in 1936, both sides were the same, equally extreme and violent. And the defeat of the military rising in Catalonia, corpses were daily found at dawn on the Carretera de l'Arrabassada, the winding country road up to Tibidabo, and on the beach at the Camp de la Bota (now part of the Forum site), it is a grave mistake to pretend that the two sides were one and the same. For one thing, the murders carried out on the Republican side were much fewer, and secondly, in the words of Gabriel Jack-

ian who lives in Barcelona, "The murders on the Republican side were committed by uncontrolled elements, whom the authorities brought under control as quickly as supporters, murder was a simply matter of policy for the purpose of terrorising the population.

But what was the background to this war that took over a million lives and has left scars of fear and hatred? By 1931, politics in Spain had started to accelerate towards the 1936 clash. On April 14 1931, after a landslide victory for the Republican parties in Spain's municipal elections, Alfonso XIII, grandfather of the present

king, fled the country. In Catalonia, the newly-formed Esquerra Republicana won the elections, and its charismatic leader Francesc Macià proclaimed Catalan independence from the balcony of the Generalitat Josep Pla, Catalonia's most famous while it is true that, in the weeks after possible". He later had to back down 1975, July 18 became a bank holiday from that initial declaration and negotiated an autonomy statute with Madrid which is actually more farreaching than today's.

The 1931 Republic raised many hopes and fears throughout Spain: hopes for an end to the Church's iron grip over education and private life, for the expropriation of the huge, uncultivated estates in Extremadura and Andalucia and for decent wages. In short, for a new,

democratic Spain and an end to the traditionalist forces of church, army, landlords and industrialists, all of whom abhorred the Republican Government, "that wretched bastard of liberal and Socialist concubinage" as the eloquent Mola put it. The army represented the true Spain, with its respect for authority and traditional values.

It was late on Saturday 18 July 1936 when news reached Barcelona that the army had taken power in Moroccan Spain. Early next morning, troops marched down from the Pedralbes Barracks to occupy strategic buildings in Barcelona's Placa de Catalunya. André Malraux described the blind courage of the anarchists in his novel Days of Hope: "Some thirty workers rushed across the square, taking what cover they could behind the trees. The machine-gun chattered and they fell in bunches. Thousands more workers were assembling near the Drassanes, the mediaeval shipyard then used as a barracks, now the beautiful Maritime Museum. These workers were prepared. The night before, self-defence groups of the CNT (the anarchist-led trades union) had raided an arms depot at the port. While in many towns in Spain the workers were defeated, in Barcelona it was touch-and-go. Only after intense fighting and after sections of the police changed sides and opposed the military revolt, was the army defeated by the end of that long Sunday.

At midday, General Goded had flown in from Mallorca to lead the military rebellion. He was captured, forced to broadcast a surrender over the radio, then shot. July 19 did not just halt the generals, in Catalonia it unleashed the full-scale social revolution the anarchists had dreamed of, the revolution that Dalí deplored and George Orwell so admired when he reached Barcelona five months later. After July 19, luxury restaurants were turned into soup kitchens for the poor, brothels were closed and factories and transport were taken over by the workers.

But Franco had the last laugh. During his regime, which lasted till and the day the extra summer wage payment was made, and thus a day that workers looked forward to. Now he is dead and Spain's fear of the past is lifting, we can see the true significance of July 18 1936 - it was the day Franco unleashed the dogs of war. The late, lamented Manuel Vázquez Montalbán summed it up thus: "We cannot reach full democracy unless we make an effort to truthfully remember the past".

Time to rethink Maremàgnum as 40 per cent of businesses shut

Management wants to bring it back by 2005 and allow only 4 night clubs with stricter controls

Barcelona's Maremàgnum, the shopping and leisure centre jetting out to the sea from the Rambles, is in big trouble. The downward spiral of unpopularity that the centre has experienced in recent years has led to 40 per cent of its businesses shutting down. The site is heading closer and closer to an inevitable oxymoron—a disenfranchised commercial centre. However, Maremàgnum management is determined not to let that happen. Sensing that the site is out of sync with what the public want, the managers are on a mission to find out exactly what that may be. A questionnaire is being conducted asking Barcelona residents how they envision a better Maremàgnum, according to a report in El Periódico.

Maremàgnum management intends to bring the complex back to life next year with a makeover that adheres to local sensibilities, and not just that of tourists who make up 75 per cent of its clientele. The site is experiencing a new era of "change in administration, in philosophy and in what it has to offer," the new Maremàgnum manager, Fraser Denton, told El Periódico. "The city should recover a space that belongs to it," Denton says. The new look is already taking shape. A new roof has been built to allow more sunlight to shine through. Construction plans include more open terraces and a new direct entrance to the second floor, expected to be completed by next summer. The planners are aware that its appeal should be more than skin deep, that new businesses are needed. "We want the city to come here for a Sunday walk," says market director Ariadna Esteve.

From a thriving night spot to a mall lost at sea

Maremàgnum opened in 1995 as a new source of family entertainment complete with cinema, restaurants and shops. Its greatest appeal was its prime location, hovering over the sea just beyond Colón's index finger. The focus quickly changed when clubbers discovered its free-entry dance floors and bars, playing a variety of salsa music and whatever summer anthem happened to be topping Spanish charts that year. The centre was seen as a success with some 18 million visitors frequenting the sea-complex each year by the late 90s. The site soon picked up a reputation of being for non-Barcelona natives, a guiri paradise. If local youth were to appear, it might have been a crowd of young men

out to pick up an Erasmus, as they often refer to study abroad students. 2002 was the year that marked Maremàgnum's downfall, when in January Ecuadorian Wilson Pacheco was stabbed to death by a security guard and, that summer, another party-goer was severely beaten. The complex lost a third of its clientele. Trying to save face, management swapped club bouncers for uniformed guards. The measure wasn't enough to pacify the heightened violence and bring the public back. Night bars and restaurants had to be shut down, and other shops soon followed. The management sees this as a new opportunity to redesign the layout, with talk of installing more clothing shops.

Nowadays industry is made up of a network of companies each responsible for the manufacturing of just one part, sometimes as simple as a plastic switch. In Catalonia, a quarter of industry is made up of subcontracting companies, the Barcelona Chamber of Commerce reports. The network of subcontractors that have taken on the work that was at one time overseen

by larger companies is made up of The days of one factory producing 9,700 businesses, with an average of 49 workers. Car parts are among the most common specialties of these smaller companies in Catalonia, according to the trade report. In many instances, they work exclusively with one company. The Chamber of Commerce has counted some 182,000 people who work for subcontracting firms, most of them with a full contract. The average earnings of this type of business is around 2.7 million euros.

SAMSUNG Former workers find jobs

A fourth of the workers that were laid off during the closing of the Samsung plant have relocated. Since the start of April, a human resources firm called Adecco has taken the task of helping those workers find new positions elsewhere. So far the firm has seen a 27 per cent success rate, as it has helped 117 of Samsung's 432 employees relocate. Around 340 workers signed up voluntarily for the HR service which assists in the job search, CV writing and interviews.

Agbar buys 30% of Suez shares Agbar has agreed with the Grupo Suez to buy 30.1 per cent of Inversiones Aguas Metropolitanas Limitada — a company in Chile that owns 51.2 per cent of the water group Aguas Andinas — for a sum of 139.4 million euros. After this deal, the company chaired by Ricard Fornesa will increase its Suez shares from its current 50 per cent to 80, and its presence in Aguas Andinas will grow from 25.6 to 41 per cent, the Catalan company reported yesterday. In terms of the agreement between Agbar and Suez, both groups will maintain the management of Inversiones Aguas Metropolitanas together and Agbar will continue to be the technical operator.

Catalan economy slow-going

Production has been growing slowly in recent years, warned minister of Trade, Tourism and Consumer Affairs, Pere Esteve, yesterday. The minister's concern comes at a time when studies are showing Catalonia to be below Spain and the EU in terms of economic growth rates. Between the years 1995 and 2002, production in Catalonia increased by 0.48 per cent, while in Spain the economy grew by 0.70 per cent in the same period, the minister pointed out in the conference The future of the Catalan economy in the global framework held yesterday at the University of Barcelona.

Catalan-Moroccan agreement

The foundation Catalunya-Marroc held its first meeting yesterday in the approval of a four-year plan with the aim of fomenting relations between the two areas, especially regarding trade and economic development. The foundation, created this past May in Casablanca in the presence of Catalan president Pasqual Maragall, is an initiative prompted by the Barcelona Chamber of Commerce and relies on the support of governments from both countries. In attendence at yesterday's meeting were Areas' José Gabriel Martín and José Luis Egea of La Caixa, among others. Some Morrocan firms were represented including Morrocan Popular Bank and Royal Air.

UN board calls US supervision of Iraq oil money inadequate

Board critical of US refusal to provide audits for non-competitive bids for lucrative contracts

US oversight over the spending of Iraq's oil revenue has been inadequate to ensure the money was used for its intended purposes, a UNmandated monitoring body said yesterday. But the International Advisory and Monitoring Board (IAMB) said an international audit of the period May 22 to December 31 last year found no evidence of fraud in the spending by the US provisional authority that ran Iraq after the invasion in March 2003.

The interim audit was requested by the monitoring board, which includes the United Nations, the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund, as part of its UNmandated task of watching over Iraq's oil revenues. The body said that despite repeated requests it had not been given access to US audits of non-competitive bids for Iraq contracts by Halliburton, the Texas oil services firm once headed by vice president Dick Cheney, and other firms. It said it planned a special study of the contracts, which will be part of the next stage of the audit carried out by US accounting firm KPMG.

Last week, Henry Waxman, a California Democrat, pressed his Republican counterparts to subpoena the US audits of the Halliburton contracts to check for possible mismanagement of funds. Under international law, the Coalition Provisional Authority — which ceased to exist last month with the handover of power to an interim Iraqi govern-

ment — could use the oil money only for the benefit of Iraqi people.

Some UN and US officials and private aid groups have expressed concern that the CPA operated with excessive secrecy. "We have not seen, or KPMG has not reported to us, any evidence of fraud," Jean-Pierre Halbwachs, chairman of the monitoring board and UN assistant secretary-general, told a news conference. "The fact that there are weaknesses could lead to fraudulent activities. It makes it easier if somebody wants to defraud any operation if controls are weak," he added.

The provisional authority had oversight over about \$10 billion in the Development Fund for Iraq. The monitoring board, which requested the audit, said KPMG concluded that all known oil proceeds in the fund had been properly and openly accounted for. But it added: "Based on a review of the KPMG reports, the IAMB believes that controls were insufficient to provide reasonable assurance for the completeness of export sales of petroleum and petroleum products for the period from May 22 to Dec. 31, 2003, and whether all DFI disbursements were made for the purposes intended."

Japan takeover agreement to create world's largest bank

UFJ, Japan's fourth largest bank, is expected to sign a deal with rival Mitsubishi Tokyo Financial Group (MTFG) which will create the world's biggest bank sometime next autumn. The two companies plan to sign an agreement by the end of this month for a takeover which will be completed between April and September 2005. Part of the transaction will involve MTFG, the country's second largest bank, injecting capital into UFJ, which is currently experiencing financial difficulties. The takeover will act as a rescue plan for UJF, which has experienced heavy losses for the past three years. The new group will have assets of more than 1.7 trillion dollars.

Nokia reports drop in mobile phone sales

Finnish mobile phone manufacturer Nokia has reported a 5 percent drop in net sales for the second quarter, with a turnover of 6.6 billion euros compared to 7 billion for the same period last year. The drop follows a sharp decline in mobile phone sales, which were 13% lower than for the same period last year, going from 4,8 billion to 4.2 billion. The company has also seen its market share dip from 32 percent to 31 percent. Net profit was up 14% due to increases in Nokia's multimedia and networks divisions. "We have managed to limit negative market share through product introductions and selective price cuts", Nokia CEO Jorma Ollila said.

Ex-CEO Kennith Lay and 30 others have been indicted.

Tech companies lift European shares

• European stocks firmed yesterday after solid technology company results calmed fears about earnings, while the dollar and euro zone government bond yields held steady ahead of key US inflation data. 
The 18th Castell de Peralada Festival opened with a flourish last night in the form of a concert by the Arturo Toscanini Philharmonic, playing works by Respighi and Dvórak and featuring a masterly performance by Maxim Vergerov, one of the most outstanding violinists of his generation. Meanwhile, tonight the headlining show is the premiere performance of Dalidance, a work choreographed by Ramon Oller. For this piece, Oller has drawn on the personality of the great artist of Figueres, though one of the highlights of the show is the fact that they will be using the original backdrops that Dalí created for three ballets in New York. Dalidance wil be performed by Oller's dance company Metros though actress Rossy de Palma will also be appearing as a special guest, playing the part of Gala and showing off her little-known talents as a ballerina.

Sunday brings a touch of Cuba to the festival, with a concert by the veteran pianist Bebo Valdés who will be playing two sets; the first, Suite Cubana, features Valdés with a 22piece big band, while the second set, with a nine-piece group, is more faithful to his salsa roots.

The festival will also include the premiere performance of a new opera, 1714-Mon de Guerres, a version of Madame butterfly by the dancer and choreographer Lindsay Kemp; the opera by Janacek The Makropoulus Case, performed by the Helikon Theatre of Moscow, the ballet Cinderella by the Cuban National Ballet and a Chinese opera. There will also be concerts by a diverse range of performers such as the German chanteuse Ute Lemper, the flamenco maestro Paco de Lucía and a special performance by Woody Allen and his jazz band. The Castell de Peralada festival, which has grown into an important European cultural event, runs until 19 August.




