# Joan Clos declares that he will accept an AVE-airport shuttle link

Madrid promises that the AVE line will reach Barcelona in 2007

The minister for Public Works, Magdalena Álvarez, declared today that the line for the high-speed train the AVE will reach the French border in 2009, and that it would first pass through Barcelona and Tarragona, in 2007 and 2006, respectively.

Álvarez, who was replying to an urgent appeal from the CiU in parliament, added that "we are currently making all the necessary decisions to ensure that considerable advances are made in the AVE infrastructure.

She also said that the AVE line from Madrid to the French border was a "priority project for this government, and thus we are making every effort to ensure that the line reaches these destinations within the stipulated time period."

Meanwhile in Barcelona, the mayor Joan Clos gave assurances that he would not adopt an "absolutist stance" in the negotiations regarding the AVE route and Barcelona airport, and said that he is prepared to accept the idea of a bullet train shuttle link from Sants station to the airport if it turned out to be impossible to link it up to the main AVE line.

"The good news", Clos pointed out,"is that an agreement has been

reached with the Spanish government to link up the AVE to Barcelon's Sants station by 2007", though fought for the idea that the AVE he had previously commented that the problem of the AVE connection with the airport "takes on a new dimension with the new relationship that exists between the Generalitat

and the Spanish government."

Clos insisted that he had always should run as far as the airport by the main line, claiming that this would be "the ideal outcome", though he did admit that perhaps a choice would have to be made between the

"ideal outcome" and a more environmentally-suitable proposal.

In Joan Clos' opinion, the AVE route was a "painful, complicated subject", and that "we should try not to burden it still further with more problems, as it seems to have been dogged by ill-luck until now".

# Zapatero revs up on the motorway toll debate

The Spanish prime minister José Luís Rodríguez Zapatero promises to tackle the toll booth issue in Catalonia, he said yesterday. Zapatero announced this in response to the question posed by the CiU spokesperson, Josep Antoni Duran Lleida, about the congressional control over the measures the previous governmen had passed. It is regarded by Catalan politicians as "discriminatory," that 59 per cent of motorways in Catalonia have tolls, compared to 23 per cent throughout Spain.

Zapatero said that an issue "of such gravity and enormous difficulty" should be negotiated in a bilateral way between administrations in Spain and Catalonia.

"We are facing a difficult problem, of great economic proportion," the prime minister said. Zapatero reminded Duran Lleida that the toll debate was never resolved when his own party Convergenci i

Unió - collaborated with the past government under José María Aznar. However, the debate goes even further back than Zapatero's predecessor. Duran Lleida bit back, saying that the same problem went unresolved during the socialist presidency of Felipe González.

### New book challenges date of birth of Christ

Jesus of Nazareth was born in Bethlehem in 76 BC - a date significantly earlier than other scholars propose - and had six siblings from Joseph's first marriage, according to a "critical" biography by a Spanish Catholic theologian regarded as one of Europe's foremost biblical scholars.

The Reverend Armand Puig, who identifies himself as a Christian believer in Jesus Christ's resurrection, worked on the book for more than 18 months. In Jesus: A Biographical Profile, which was launched yesterday, Puig attempts to give historical answers to some of the mysteries surrounding Christ's life, including the reason why he did not begin his public activity until the age of 30 - three years before being cruci - or who was really responsible for his death.

The author, who is professor of New Testament studies at the School of Theology in the northeastern region of Catalonia, told a news conference that he wanted to examine the figure of Jesus "from the perspective of a critical biography". Puig said his Christianity should not prevent "members of other faiths feeling comfortable with the book, because it has an ecumenical vision".

Theologian and philosopher Francesc Torralba also spoke at the book launch. He said the work "is solid, thanks to the author's knowledge of (biblical) texts and the environment in which Jesus lived, and it's also instructive and easy to understand."

The book is divided into six parts and begins with an overview of the different sources, both Christian and non-Christian, which have dealt with the figure of Jesus through the ages. It also explores the context in which Christ lived in Galilee, and in the fourth chapter, Puig centers on the period from Jesus's birth in Bethlehem until he became a public figure.

The book ends with Jesus's reaction to his own looming death, the meaning he drew out of it, and concludes with a reference to his resurrection. But for the clergyman, "the last page of his existence is not his death, but his life. That is where the memory and faith in Jesus begin, in Christ's death and resurrection. That is where Christianity begins." Puig, Torralba said, has made "a critical and rigorous study with a certain scientific detachment, de spite the fact that the author does not hide his favorable view of the character."

Puig, 51, is the director of the San Fructuoso Institute of Religion, and co-ordinated the translation of the Catalan Interfaith Bible. He is also a member of the prestigious Studiorum Novi Testamenti Societas, which includes the world's leading New Testament scholars.

# Immigrants make up 8% of population

More Latin Americans are emigrating to Europe and sending money home

The latest data on legal residents released in 2003 by the *Instituto Nacional de Estadística* indicates that there are over 2.5 million foreigners registered to live in all of Spain. The number four times higher than five years ago. Catalonia is one of the communities that has experienced the most growth. Barcelona recently heard louder than ever the cries from immigrant groups demanding the right to live and work legally. Riot police were sent to break up a sit-in that had been staged by immigrants in two churches in the city.

In terms of numbers, the leading province in Catalonia is Girona, where 11.2 per cent of its population are foreign born. The province trails just behind Alicante (15.1 per cent) and the Balearic Islands (13.4 per cent) 11.2 per cent. Catalonia, with nearly 550,000 foreign residents, comes second after Madrid in the list of communities with the highest number of immigrants.

For a variety of reasons, Spain has turned into one of the most attractive destinations for people from all over Europe. On the one hand, geographically speaking, it is the boarder between Africa and Europe. On the other, Latin Americans have been increasingly drawn to Spain, partly because of the language facility. Not to mention the growing number of Europeans making Spain a stop on their holiday trail or as a permanent place for retirement. The growing Spanish economy has lead more and more Eastern Europeans to come looking for work as well.

In light of the growing number of Latin American immigrants, a phenomenon has been developing where the portion of émigrés' earnings sent to their home countries has become vital to Latin American economies. A study by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) on Tuesday revealed that

each year Hispanic expats send more than a billion euros back to their homelands. Spain is the main European destination for immigrants from that region. Since 1995, their numbers have quintupled.

However, it is difficult to say exactly how many immigrants there really are. The IOM study showed that 390,000 Ecuadorians were listed in Spanish municipal registries in 2003. On the other hand, the inter-

ior ministry noted that only 174,000 Ecuadorians had legal residence in Spain. Even if they are not legal, immigrants are encouraged to register with the local authorities to gain access to services like free health care.

### Bins to reduce beach waste

Barcelona City Council will install rubbish bins on all its beaches in a bid to keep them tidy and safe. The move is designed to stop bathers and users of the beaches from dumping their waste such as bottles, tins and paper on the sand. Last year eight tons of rubbish was collected weekly from the beaches by the City Council during the summer months.

Starting next week people 330 rubbish bins will be installed on all

of Barcelona's beaches in a bid tp persude people to dispose of their own waste. 80 will be yellow in colour, to signify the collection of glass, plastic, aluminium and bottles. The remainder will be for general waste.

The City Councilhas will also place information boards on the beaches explaining to swimmers and sunbathers the time it takes for rubbish to decompose - three months for tissue paper, 25 years for

cardboard, 100 years for aluminium and plastic and 4000 years for glass.

A major problem on the beaches are cigarrete ends which represents 60% of all the rubbish collected on the Barcelona's beaches. In a bid to reduce this type of waste, plastic ash trays will be ditributed amongst swimmers, by green campaigners who will also provide information about the environment and the need for reducing waste.

# Bilingualism slows down brain decline

Researchers have discovered that being able to speak two languages keeps the brain mentally agile into old age. Boffins from York University in Canada conducted tests on 104 people between the ages of 30 and 88. The results published in the journal of Psychology and Ageing show that being bilingual might offer protection against senile dementia in old people. Previous tests have shown that if the brain is stimulated through activity it can keep a person mentally agile into old age. Research proved that people who play musical instruments, dance, read or do crosswords on a regular basis were less likely to develop senile demen-

The latest research by the team at York University indicates that language skills can also prevent the onset of the condition. The Canadian researchers selected half the volunteers from Canada, who spoke only English. The rest came from India and spoke both English and Tamil. All the volunteers were from a similar background, middle-class and educated. The team employed a wide range of tests including vocabulary skills, non-verbal reasoning ability and their reaction.

The results were quite conclusive as it found the volunteers who

were fluent in English and Tamil responded faster than those who could only speak English across all the age groups. "The bilinguals were more efficient at all ages tested and showed a slower rate of decline for some processes with ageing. It appears that bilingualism helps to offset age-related losses," says a research team.

The results have been welcomed by the UK Alzheimer's Society who claim that education in general can provide positive benefits to mental agility in old age. "These findings, that early development of second language may improve a specific aspect of cognitive function in later life, are very interesting, but the results of this study need to be interpreted carefully," says Professor Clive Ballard to the BBC. "



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# Iran says it has a right to continue developing its nuclear programme

Iranian president criticises accusation of hindering inspections

The president of Iran has claimed that his country was under no moral obligation to stop enriching uranium in response to a possible repremand by the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA).

The IAEA has received a draft resolution which puts pressure on Iran to be more forthcoming about it's nuclear programme, which has existed for 20 years but was only made public two years ago.

The draft, authored by Germany, France and the UK, is expected to be adopted by the IAEA within a matter of days. While it repremands Iran for its nuclear policy, it does not recommend sanctions or other forms of punnishment.

Iranian president Mohammad Khatami responded with some ambiguity. "We have no moral commitment anymore to suspend uranium enrichment", he told the Associated Press."Of course, we don't declare that we want to do something".

However, he rejected any suggestion that Iran would consider withdrawing from the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, and said that the treaty gives Iran the right to have a nuclear programme for peaceful purposes, such as generating electricity.

"A resolution that denies us of our definite right (to have a nonmilitary nuclear programme will not be valid", he said."We will not accept it."

He characterised the draft as being "counterproductive for the continuance of co-operation" and suggested that Iran may consider halting some of its business dealings

# Saddam had no links with terror group over the 11-S attacks

A commision investigating the 11 September 2001 attacks in the United States said it cannot find any evidence that Iraq gave assistance to al-Qaeda. The commission made its statement before it began its final two-day public session. It contradicts remarks made by the US vicepresident earlier this week about Saddam Hussein's "long-established ties" with al-Qaeda. The 11 September attacks killed nearly were flown by al-Queda members into the New York World Trade Centre and the Pentagon.

The statement called Overview of the Enemy was prepared by commission staff and according to the BBC contains"initial findings to present to the public on the nature of the enemy that carried out the 11 September attacks". It paints a picture of a range of missed opportunities which will make the Bush ad-

ministration feel uneasy. It outlines the roots of al-Qaeda and its activities and claims Bin Laden had looked at the possibility of working with Iraq, even though he was oppossed to Saddam's secular regime. According to the statement a senior Iraqi intelligence officer had met Bin Laden in 1994 who wanted help with training and weapons."There have been reports that contacts between Iraq and al-Qaeda also occur-3,000 people after hijacked planes red after Bin Laden had returned to further witnesses this week includ-Afghanistan, but they do not appear to have resulted in a working relationship. Two senior Bin Laden associates have adamantly denied that any ties existed between al-Qaeda and Iraq. We have no credible evidence that Iraq and al-Qaeda co-operated on attacks against the United States,"says the statement according to the BBC.

The statement does say that al-Queda remains a threat as it at-


tempts to launch "chemical, biological, radiological or nuclear attacks." It also highlights that the terror group was founded in the late 1980's and it relied on a fundraising system rather than through Bin Laden's personal fortune. It states that there is no convincing evidence that any government financially supported al-Qaeda before the 11 September attacks.

The commission heard from ing several of the federal government's top law and intelligence experts. Also expected to testify in public will be top military officials, including General Richard Myers, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, which will be his second appearance before the body. In Aprilit spoke in private to President George W Bush and Dick Cheney. A final report on the commission's findings is due out on 28 July.

### Women in Spain want to have more children says survey

A study has revealed that about two out of three women in Spain want more children. The survey by the Centre of Sociological Investigations (CI)S showed that due to economic reasons and work commitments they were unable to have more children. The study also revealed that 67% of those quizzed blamed the cost of living as the main reason for not having more children. The study quizzed 1,532 women of various ages between 20 and 45 years during a one month period in December last year and January this year. In an ideal situation 38% of the women who took part in the survey wanted three children, and nearly 13% wanted two, while 11.5% wanted four children. Over half of the women, nearly 58% responded that they would have two children and 15% would prefer to have one child. Only 13% aspired to have three children. The study also showed that women might achieve their goal of having more children if measures were in place to help them such economichelp, an increase in nursery's in places of work and part time work for women. Spain is a country with the lowest birth rate and an average of 1.22 children per family. The survey revealed that 50% of those interviewed wereinvolved with caring for a child while 40% of the women spoke of raising their children together. The survey was carried out between 8 December 2003 and 7 of January 2004.

### President's family has Aids

Zimbabwe President Robert Mugabe has claimed that members of his family had been affected by the Aids virus. He made the revelation during his country's first conference on the disease claiming it was "one of the greatest challenges facing our nation" but not impossible to beat. However, critics of his government say that the issue is overshadowing the county's economic and social problems. According to figures as much as 3,000 people a week die of Aids-related illnesses. The number of HIV/Aids cases in Zimbabwe rose to about 1.8 million in

### Muslim school girl ordered to wear uniform

A British judge has ordred a Muslim girl to dress in the uniform of her school. The judgement was made in the High Court to decide if the Muslim school girl could attend her school wearing traditional religious costume covering her head or if she was obliged to wear uniform. The judgement was made after Shabina Begum had not attended her school since September 2002 claiming they were denying her educational and religous rights. But the judge said school uniform was multicultural and this was the reason why he moved in favour of Denbigh School in Luton.



### Investigation into bomb blast opens

A Spanish parliamentary commission to investigate the Madrid train blast that killed 191 has held its first meeting. It has two months to find out the exact course of events between the 11 March bombings and the general elections three days later. It has the power to call anyone for questioning including the former President of the Spanish Government Jose Maria Aznar. The 16-member commission has been given an extensive mandate in order to satisfy the demands of all of Spain's main political parties. Ten bombs exploded on four trains in the centre of Madrid.

### On the new archbishop

**EDITORIAL** 

he Vatican yesterday appointed Lluís Martínez Sistach, until now the most senior cleric in Tarragona, the new archbishop of Barcelona. The decision came as no surprise as last September the two-year extension that Pope John Paul II had demanded of Ricard Maria Carles came to an end. The Vatican also made public the recently announced division of the archbishopric into three bishoprics - Barcelona, Terrassa, (including the whole of the Vallès) and Sant Feliu de Llobregat, the latter which will include the Baix Llobregat, the Alt Penedès, the Garraf, and controversially, Montserrat.

Yesterday's announcement, which included the names of those to be placed in charge, caused quite a stir. Just about all the sectors of the Church criticised the way the decision had been taken. Such a general critical reaction is understandable considering that the decision was made behind the backs of the faithful. Carles himself said yesterday that it was the Bone's de

that it was the Pope's decision and he would have to obey, thereby suggesting that he did not agree with the way he had been told.

Whatever the case, it is the Church that has to evaluate if, as with Madrid, the demographic importance of the Barcelona Almost all Church sectors criticised the way the decision had been taken

Metropolitan Area justifies the division of the diocese. And it will be down to the new bishops to determine whether an issue that has begun so badly can be adequately put to rights.

The profiles of the new bishops, and particularly that of Tarragona, the Opus Dei priest Jaume Pujol, hardly seems the best choice to govern the Catalan Church with a progressive vision and one that addresses the needs of today's society.

Although it is also true that the appointment of Sistach as archbishop of Tarrogona raised doubts at the time while his term in office ended up being relatively moderate.

These appointments are nevertheless in line with the Church's strategic move to the right during Pope John Paul II's mandate.

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### Chinese warriors at the Forum

he Forum's must-see exhibition of Xian warriors, the first stop for most visitors, was out of action Tuesday thanks to the rain. Despite being housed in a custom-built facility in the port of Sant Adrià, the brand new building was unable to cope with the heavy downpours of Sunday evening and Monday night. The organisers decided to to play it safe and close the exhibition for inspection. After a morning of waiting, the organisers breathed a sigh of relief when it was found that none of the warriors had been damaged. The only victim was a wall with a glass display case containing smaller pieces, which was later removed. By two in the afternoon the exhibition was once more open to the public.

The organiser's concern is understandable as any damage to the warriors would have brought the only attraction to have drawn any reasonable number of visitors to the Forum so far to an end, to say nothing of the crippling effect such a disaster would have had on the insurance company and the Clos administration.

The more than 8,000 terracota warriors were originally made 2000 years ago to guard the mausoleum of Quin Shihuang, the first emperor of China. The Forum has only 15 of these displayed in a hall of mirrors that gives the impression of a ranked army, showing the typically Catalan



knack of getting value for money.

Not that the exhibition is cheap. The rental of the 15 statues is part of an experiment by the Chinese government, that if successful here will be offered around the world to raise income for further excavations at the site where they were found.

It seems that the investment may have been worth it. As with the black madonna at Montserrat that pilgrims kiss before starting their extensive and exotic excursions, the Xian warriors make the Forum what it is. As long as it doesn't rain, that is.

# The peculiar joys of going it alone

h not to be in England when the European elections come around. What a relief to live in another country and not to feel in any way accountable for the festival of little England that is celebrated whenever the time comes to vote for European MPs.

So 2.6 million Britons voted to leave Europe, as that is what a vote for the UK Independence Party means. When you live in Europe that is, not in Britain, which is a continent unto itself, you are still occasionally expected to account for your fellow Britons. The three most frequent and difficult questions are: Why do they get so drunk? Whats the big deal about fox hunting? And

why do they hate Europe?

Who can say? But, however disastrous to the economy, it would make millions of people feel good. Plucky little England, the Dunkirk spirit. All that tired old isolationist nonsense about going it alone. Why, people ask? Once you've trotted out the old cliches about island mentality and so forth all you can do is throw up your hands and say: "I've no idea. They're like that, that's all.

It is as though there are two Europes; the one Brits visit in their millions, and another evil Europe of the mind that seeks to destroy them and all they hold dear. The first Europe is Tuscany, Dordogne, Languedoc and the vast areas of Spain that the Brits visit every year, where they

own second homes and go home laden with wine and cheese and jamón iberico, moaning that they have to go back rainy Britain.

The other Europe is a threat to national identity, big brother in Brussels. Has it never occurred to anyone in Britain that the French and Spanish and Italians are just as protective about their cultural identity? Would they all sign up to something that seriously threatened their way of life? The question is, if no one else feels threatened, what are the Brits scared of?

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# Spain third in league of riches

India and China top the list as having world's most new-found fortunes

It is well-known that Spain is in the process of steadily catching up to other wealthier European countries. A recent study referred to in El Periódico yesterday on the spread of wealth in the world has shown just how far some of the country's citizens have come. In 2003, Spain was third on the list of countries where individuals had recently become wealthy, while the country came first in the EU. According to the Merrill Lynch study the number of high net worth individuals (HNIs) was nearly 130,000, 18 per cent more than the previous year. Financial experts agree that much of the new-found wealth boils down to the real estate boom. "It's very likely that a considerable number of people have profited from high prices in the Spanish real estate sector," Merrill Lynch representative Juan Carlos Crespo told *El Periódico*. Ahead of Spain in new HNIs are Hong Kong and India, the study shows.

In India the rich got richer last year as a result of the stock market boom and high economic growth. About 61,000 HNIs in India watched their wealth skyrocket by 22 per cent in 2003 to over 200 billion euros, the World Wealth Report declared yesterday. The growth in Indian HNIs (with more than 1 million euros) was rapid, compared to the rest of the world, which has 7.7

worldwide were quick to respond to global trends, bettering their chances at maintaining and increasing wealth. "Wealthy investors in US, China and India were able to capitalise on economic trends (a strong stock market rally and solid global economic growth) despite a great deal of geo-political uncertainties," million millionaires. In 2002 HNIs Rajan Sehgal of Merrill Lynch, said.

At the top of the list was the US with 2.27 million HNIs till the end of 2003, which was up by 14 per cent from the previous year. China's well-to-do persons saw their wealth increase by 12 per cent last year. Similar to Spain, the number of rich people in China and India was mainly attributed to the high economic growth in 2003. "Following

the two impressive years, both India and China registered red hot GDP growth rates, 7.4 per cent and 9.1 per cent, respectively," the report said. In reference to the last year's booming stock market in India, it said: "Mumbai continued its 2002 growth at an accelerated pace ending 2003 at 110 per cent higher than where it began the year."

Sánchez also said that as well as the two office blocks at Diagonal Mar, his group was involved in a number of residential projects in Catalonia, as well as the promotion of industrial warehouse space.



# Moscow court adjourns trial of one of country's richest men

Khodorkovsky claims Kremlin's political motives are behind his trial

A court in Moscow has adjourned the trial of Mikhail Khodorkovsky, one of Russia's richest businessmen. The reason given for the adjournment was to allow a member of the defence team to recover from eye surgery. No date has been set to restart the trial.

Khodorkovsky was on trial for his involvement in political affairs when he had reportedly had an agreement with the Russian government to stay out of political affairs.

Khodorkovsky and his lawyers claim that he is being put on trial for political reasons, which the Kremlin has denied. His defence attorneys say there is little chance of getting an aquittal because the Russian governemnt is intent on prosecuting him. "They are going to be found guilty", one of the lawyers told the BBC. "We know the outcome. It is a show trial to help the government expropriate

Another of Khodorkovsky's lawyers accused the government of conducting a the trial in a less than transparent fashion. According to a report by AFP, a news agency, only ten journalists were allowed into the

courtroom, while plenty of space trial, a common practice in Russian was made available for spectators to witness the trial.

The report also said that Khodorkovsky and co-defendant Platon Lebedev were placed in cages for the

legal proceedings.

On trial with Khodorkovsky is Lebedev had been one of Khodorkovsky's most important business partners.

Khodorkovsky became rich during the 1990s, some say from the large-scale of the governments assets during that period.

Some say that Khodorkovsky's legal problems stem from an agreement he had made with the Kremlin whereby they would not investigate his financial affairs connected with Yukos if he did not become involved in politics.

The company has a 3.4 billion unpaid tax claim which could send it into bankruptcy. Another trial will determine whether this amount must be paid immediately.

"The fate of Yukos and its key shareholders is in the government's hands", according to one analyist.

Khodorkovsky has a net worth of more than 15 billion dollars, much of which is tied up in shares of Kudo. If the company goes bankrupt much of his net worth evap-

According to several experts, the bankruptcy of Kudos is inevitable.

### Thai company to buy into club

Thai entertainment group GMM Grammy is putting together a consortium to buy a 30% stake in Liverpool football club, according to officials. The bid will replace an offer made by Thailand's Prime Minister, Thaksin Shinawatra. Heannounced plans to buy a stake in the club earlier in the year but the deal turned sour after it was revealed that the prime minister planned to use state money and not his own fortune to fund the offer. GMM Grammy said it would need about 66 million pounds sterling to buy the stake in the club. GMM chairman, Paiboon Damrongchaitham said a holding company would manage the Liverpool stake, overseeing the marketing and licensing of the club brand. He said the private consortium could include Thailand's biggest brewer, Thai Beverages and possibly its largest mobile phone company, Advanced Info Service."We have not yet met with Liverpool chief executive, Rick Parry, or other senior representatives of the club but we are planning to send our representative to meet with them soon," says a spokesman for the Thai group. He added I think this deal should be done via the private sector and we will take the risk of the profit or loss. It is Thailand's biggest music company and owns 12 radio stations.

### Bank to close branches

The Alliance and Leicester Bank will close 46 branches from 1 October, affecting 310 staff members of whom 111 are full time. In a statement the bank said the closures would save around five million pounds a year after a review of services. It said the decision was due to the increasing number of customer who now choose to do their banking through direct channels such as the internet. Most branches that are closing are in London and the south east of England, leaving it with 254 branches across the UK. It said the cost of the closures would be under ten million pounds. In February, it is reported a rise in annual pre-tax profits to 525 million pounds. A spokesman said, "80% of our customers bank over the internet, over the telephone or via cash machines. A strong branch network remains an important part of our future business model" We nevertheless are witnessing a reduction in the number of transactions as our customers use other direct channels.



# Electro-heads hit town as Sónar puts the beat back on the street

The festival is the most important electronic music event in southern Europe

Prepare yourself for an adventure to an electronic landscape where sound, visual displays and the con $fluence\,of\,the\,two\,will\,be\,your\,guide.$ From June 17-19 the Sónar Festival of Advanced Music and Multimedia Art is celebrating its 11th year in Barcelona and l'Hospitalet de Llobregat, turning the cities into an experimental laboratory where beats and audivisuals seem to have no limits. A combination of its performance lineup, cutting edge multimedia installations and a culturally eclectic atmosphere have helped make Sónar the most important electronic music event in Southern Europe.

Sónar growing exponentially. Ramon Súrio, a journalist for La Vanguardia, wrote: "Within a decade one could consider that, without a doubt, the festival has gone from being a tiny creative underground scene to a brand name that goes far beyond advanced music." And its name is heard around the world. Last year, for the first time in the event's history, the organisers had to hang "Sold out" signs by the entrance of the event, selling over 90,000 tickets. Months before opening day this week, thousands of young followers of electronic music worldwide were planning their trip to Barcelona, perhaps for the second or third time, to take part in the three-day experience.

Hiphopistherising star in the Sónar system, which shows a certain awareness among the Advanced Music organisation that more and more electro-heads are turning towards rap, and vice-versa. Performing Friday night at the SonarPark, the English group Roots Manuva embodies this new current with Jamaican accented rhyming and intergalactic-sounding beats. Other hip hop acts include Gang Starr, Madlib, Beans and Spain's own La Mala Rodriguez. Among La Mala will be the most feminine roster in the history of the festival.

At Sónar, as the old school hip hop track goes, "the freaks come out at night, and during the day. From 1 pm till soundown, visitors can mingle, dance, check out multimedia installations or just "chill out" at the festival's daytime Raval locations (CCCB, Macba, Centre d'Art Santa Mònica). There will be a series of concerts, DJ sets, a professional fair, the SonarMática multimedia area, audio-visual projections, conferences and exhibits.

Sónar turns into a series of pumping cardo Villalobos. Saturday night has club venues. With the exception of Thursday, which features an unusual musical concoction by the Orquestra Simfònica de Barcelona i Nacional de Catalunya playing classical pieces to be remixed live by the great Ryuichi Sakamoto at the Auditori, Friday and Saturday will go on into the wee hours in Hospitalet. On the second night, feet will be stomping to the likes of some of the hip hop greats mentioned before, as well as an electronic battle featuring DJ Richie Hawtin vs Ri-

yet another tremendous back-toback lineup: Massive Attack, Jeff Mills and Carl Cox.

Almost as flashy as the musicians themselves, Sónar's flyers and posters have always made their mark. A few years back, the sales pitch was a series of photographs of ordinary families with large wet stains at the crotch region of their trousers or skirts, suggesting that they'd just wet themselves with excitement at the forthcoming event. In 2002 Barcelona saw its streets and bars lined

party. Most notably, on Saturday 19 June at the CCCB, Robert Moog will be participating in the forum on "Classic Electronica". If it weren't for Bob Moog's invention of the synthesizer back in 1954, it is hard to imagine where either modern or classical music would be today.

The upcoming event is not music to everyone's ears, however. Now a neighbourhood tradition, residents in the Raval have hung large banners above the streets near to the Sónar by day venue, expressing their grievances at being invaded by a cacophony of weird, tweaking machanical sounds. The event goes against a campaign being promoted by neighbourhood associations around Barcelona to reduce noise. Nevertheless, once again the neighbours will have to suffer through it.

For those who don't mind the ear damage, this year's festival, part of Barcelona's Forum, promises to be three days of varied electronic music, dialogues and exhibitions and, as the ritual unfolds, writhing bodies on Sónar's dance floors will be the ultimate form of expression.

### Ray Charles and company

Last year, before his illness had worsened, Ray Charles began recording a rare studio set of duets called Genius Loves Company. His upcoming album on Concord, due out August, contains works eternalised by the late singer-pianist-songwriter, accompanied by admirers such as Natalie Cole, James Taylor, Bonnie Raitt, Elton John, Norah Jones, Willie Nelson, Diana Krall, B.B. King, Gladys Knight, Johnny Mathis and Michael McDonald.

### B.B. King on tour

He is not exactly one of the "The Blues Brothers," but B.B. King does admit that he is on a mission involving blues music. Even at 78, B.B. and his beloved guitar "Lucille" can be found touring round the world. Soon the blues maestro will be setting foot on Iberian soil, hoping to hit seven cities. The tour sets off on 23 June in Valencia and ends in Barcelona on 2 July.

### Indian police guard lesbian film

The country music star, famous for songs such as "By The Time I Get To Phoenix" and "Rhinestone Cowboy," pleaded guilty last month to the two misdemeanor charges after a collision near his Phoenix home in which no one was injured. Campbell has not only warned others not to drink and drive, but has said not to drink at all.

# Orwell censored over his disgust for "the great masturbator"

Essay on autobiography reveals how the puritanical Orwell felt repulsed by Dalí

If they were both alive today, George dalously fraudulent work - a perfor-Orwell and Salvador Dalí would be two old men of 100. This might be the year of Dalí's centenary celebrations, but we learn more about Orwell through the wonderful exhibition Viatge a una guerra: George Orwell a Catalunya i al front dAragó (Journey to a War: George Orwell in Catalonia and at the Aragon Front). In addition to recreating Orwell's experiences in the Spanish Civil War, the exhibition shows the crucial effects the war had on his life afterwards, fuelling his conviction that Stalinist totalitarianism was as bad as Nazism, as expressed in his classic work, Homage to Catalonia. Orwell never mentioned Figueres, but he knew of the town's most famous son, about whom he wrote a long essay in June 1944.

Orwell had just read the recently-published Secret Life of Salvador Dalí, and the book had evidently enfuriated him. Nevertheless (and typically of Orwell), instead of just writing off the work, he tried to analyse why it disgusted him so much. For Orwell, Dalí's book was a scan-

mance piece, a "striptease act" filled with patently unbelievable incidents and stripped of anything that could be considered normal. However, precisely because of that, Orwell concluded that the book was a valuable document, being proof of the "perversion of instinct" produced by the machine age. Orwell cited a few of the more shocking incidents, such as when Dalí boasted about giving his three-year-old sister a kick in the head and describing the pleasure he got from it. Later on, the painter describes how, as a teenager, he had invented what he called a "five-year plan", which consisted of spending 5 years erotically exciting a girl and then humiliating her.

The writer also criticises him for not taking sides when the Civil War war broke out, but simply fleeing to Italy. Then, just before World War II, he only worried about finding a place from which he could escape if danger came too close. And so he went off to the United States.

It is fascinating the way Orwell was scandalised by Dalís "perversions". With his strong sense of Victorian puritanism, Orwell was exasperated by Dalís scatalogical themes, and he described Dalí (ironically) as having all the perversions one could wish for, except for homosexuality. And no doubt due partly to his wartime experiences, when he witnessed death at first hand, he felt a particular disgust for Dalís fascination with rotting corpses. For Orwell, Secret Life was a book that "stinks", and he wondered whether that comment would amuse Dalí, who claimed to have smeared himself in goat faeces when he had gone to court Gala.

Perhaps the most interesting aspect of the essay is that Orwell very consciously anticipated what became a focal point of the first conference held in honour of Dalís centenary. Although Dalí repulsed him, Orwell recognised that Dalí the artist had exceptional qualities. Dalí, he thought, was not a fraud, and had much more talent than most of those who denounced his immorality or made fun of him. The essay's title, Benefit of Clergy: Some Notes on

Salvador Dalí, derives from the medieval idea that the clergy were exempt from the powers of secular courts. To Orwell, the defenders of Dalí's work had placed him in a privileged category in which he could enjoy moral irresponsibility. Orwell believed that two things should be accepted about Dalí: that he was a good artist, but also a disgusting person. Benefit of Clergy was published in 1944 in a collection of essays by different writers, but the Hutchinson publishing company soon removed the article from the book, deeming it obscene. Orwell once stated that despite all his criticism, he did not agree with such an intolerant idea as censoring Dalís writings or paintings.

Ironically, it was not in Nazi Germany, Fascist Italy or Stalin's USSR, but Churchill's heroic England that people tried to suppress Orwell's essay about Dalí, which, of course, contains absolutely no ob-

### Bacardi: I never knew he was a Catalan...

The "Cuba libre" and the Daiquiri were it not for an astute Catalan. cardi Massó changed the way people viewed the rum cocktail. In fact, his innovative fermentation process turned rum from what was considered at the time as an unrefined drink into a classy spirit.

After emigrating to Cuba in the early 19th century, Don Facundo, a wine merchant, purchased a small tin-roofed distillery in Santiago de Cuba in 1862.

He tried several techniques until would never have been possible discovering the key to making rum into a refined liquor: filtering it Born in Sitges in 1814, Facundo Ba- through charcoal to remove the impurities, then ageing it in oak barrels to "mellow" the taste.

> The Bacardi brand became much loved in the US, to the point that the American general Leonard Wood appointed Don Facundo's eldest son mayor of Santiago de Cuba. Later on, the company also helped to attract Americans to the island. During Prohibition, Bacardi invited Don Facundo Bacardi Massó



them to "Come to Cuba and bathe in Bacardi rum."

When Fidel Castro arrived, the company was not viewed with the same fondness by the revolutionaries, and the feeling was mutual. The company fled Cuba for the Bahamas and Fidel seized the assets it left behind. Hernando Calvo Ospina claimed that Bacardi financed anti-Castro groups in the 1960s, helped to found the Cuban American National Foundation (CANF) in 1981 and supported the Helms-Burton legislation of 1996.

### Conference explores Cervantes heritage

Don Quixote, that sad multi-faceted idealist who has spawned so many pages of literary criticism and is now seen as a symbol of European culture - not to mention as the quintessence of the Spanish character was the main subject of an international convention that opened yesterday in association with Forum 2004. Quixote and modern thought, which is being held at the Centre de Convencions for the whole of this week, represents an attempt to assess and debate the importance of this novel, which has influenced so many literary genres including the romantics, the baroque and even the

The convention is taking place as an introduction to the coming year's celebrations of the 400th anniversary of Cervantes' masterpiece. Around a hundred specialists are attending the conference - including university professors, students and researchers, many of whom will be meeting up again in 2005 to analyse the most wellknown character in Spanish liter-

The inaugural session was opened by the philosopher Eugenio Trías, who spoke about the huge range of interpretations which have been made of the novel, as well as exploring Cervantes' acute sense of tragedy. Later on, the writer Antonio Regado discussed the contrasts that exist within the book between ideas and reality, while Montserrat Herrero' presentation dealt with Quixote's influence on the romantic novel and the way in which the main character was appropriated by the romantic movement as a symbolic figure.

Meanwhile, Christof Strozetzski examined the sad knight from the viewpoint of Hegelian philosophy, and subsequently went on to address an aspect of the novel which touches more recent historical events - the reasons that the central character gives which he believes justify war, and particularly preventive attacks. Strozetski reminded us that Ouixote considered there were five causes which would justify the opening of hostilities against an enemy: firstly, an attack on the Catholic faith, secondly, self-defence, thirdly, defence of one's honour, home and family, fourthly, to serve the king, and finally, to defend one's homeland, thereby showing that some things never change over the centuries. The conference will close on Friday with a debate and speech by the writer Carmen Riera, who will be presenting Quixote from the point of view of Catalan nation-

To celebrate the occasion of Cervantes' anniversary in 2005, La Real Academia Española will be publishing a special popular edition of the novel which will be 1,400 pages long and will cost 9 Euros.

# Van Gaal breaks silence to reflect on ups and downs at Barcelona

Former Barça coach predicts that Spain will beat France in final of Euro 2004

"The first time fantastic; the second time disastrous." For the last year and a half since leaving Barcelona, Louis van Gaal has kept silent from his refuge as technical director at Ajax. These days he is commentating at Euro 2004 and took time out to talk to El 9.

Not surprisingly, Van Gaal has bad memories of his second time as Barcelona manager, blaming his problems on lack of control when it came to signing players: "They wouldn't let me sign the players I wanted. They imposed a player on me that I didn't want and who upset the balance of the team," he said.

No prizes for guessing that he is talking about Juan Román Riquelme. During his second term at the club, the conflict between the two was never out of the news: "The press made a lot of the conflict and so it was difficult for both of us to work," he said.

Another of Van Gaal's players is now involved in a similar conflict,

but Van Gaal points out that Patrick Kluivert's problems only began after he himself had left: "He needs a hard manager," he said, "I leave Barcelona and things start getting difficult for him."

Kluivert is just one of many Dutch players that have left in a process of dehollandisation at the club that Van Gaal sees as natural. Still, he insists that a complete purge of Dutch players was not a good idea: "To keep the balance in the changing room, it would have been better if one had stayed," he said, adding, "Cocu would have been ideal."

One Dutchman he is willing to praise is Frank Rijkaard, highlighting his ability to find the right balance on the field in the way he has used Ronaldinho: "Ronaldinho plays like Rivaldo in my time, with freedom. He goes on to add, In fact, it's the system that I imposed with Xavi playing in front of Cocu."

Van Gaal is full of praise for Ronaldinho although he admits to feeling dubious when he first heard about the signing: "At first I thought it was a risk, but since he arrived at Barcelona he has scored goals and made his mark.'




